51825 INDIA Innovative Approaches to Social Development in India (Debby Jacobson deborah.jacobson@case.edu) The program provides a unique opportunity for educational and recreational excursions to New Delhi and Mumbai (Bombay) and Jaipur, as well as visitation at local and regional NGOs. Participants will learn about projects involving education, international funding, government initiatives and use of information technology for social development. The study abroad course will explore innovative approaches to social development in India and draw parallel to that of the United States. Students and participants will become familiar with Indian social development and social policy issues in regards to poverty alleviation, non-formal education, prostitution, HIV-AIDS, multicultural aspects of health care, international adoption and application of information communication technologies in addressing social problems. The trip will include guided tours to neighborhoods, field-action project sites, social and educational institutions and government establishments. Daily lectures by practicing social workers, policy advocates, field workers, health care professionals, government officials and eminent Indian scholars and researchers associated with Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Delhi School of Social Work and the National Institute of Information Technology. Students and participants will also visit the majestic Taj Mahal and usher in the New Year among exotic palaces of Jaipur.

19684 Survey the Netherlands (undergraduates) (Lori D'Angelo lori@magnoliacubhouse.org & Grover Gilmore grover.gilmore@case.edu)
This survey 3 credit course is designed to familiarize students with Dutch social policies and practices for prostitution, drug use, substance abuse, social services, neighborhood social control, homelessness, and multicultural aspects of health care. The trip includes guided tours of neighborhoods and social institutions and lectures by practitioners and scholars in the field.

19703 Health Policy (Sarah Parran & Debby Jacobson deborah.jacobson@case.edu) This 3 credit course will acquaint students with the socio-political factors that influence the delivery of health care and health-related services to the citizens of the Netherlands. The role of the social work profession in health care and service delivery will be explored via agency visits, lectures, and collaboration with Dutch experts in the area of health care.

19748 Mental Health (Patrick Boyle patrick.boyle@case.edu & Debby Jacobson deborah.jacobson@case.edu) This 3 credit course will offer students an opportunity to compare aspects of the adult mental health system in the Netherlands and the United States (Cuyahoga County) to explore how "Culture Matters". The definition of mental illness, the deinstitutionalization of the mentally ill and the current treatment and support systems will be contrasted. There will be a focus on dual diagnosis issues related to people who have a mental illness and substance abuse problems, dual systems issues related to people who have a mental illness and have committed a crime, and a look at an international model of psychosocial rehabilitation in both settings. The subjective experience of people who have a mental illness will be central to the learning experience, which will include guided visits to various organizations and lectures by practitioners and scholars in the field.

19801 Child Welfare in Guatemala (Victor Groza victor.groza@case.edu & Debby Jacobson deborah.jacobson@case.edu) This 3 credit course will acquaint the participant with the socio-political factors that influenced the development of child welfare programs in the nongovernmental sector (private, nonprofit sector) and governmental sector in Guatemala. The role of the helping professions in child welfare will be explored via agency visits, lectures, and collaboration with Ukrainian professionals and researchers. The goals are to provide participants with the necessary conceptual background, knowledge base, and analytical skills learning about child welfare in another country and to learn about Guatemala child welfare policies and practices, and how policy affects the delivery system and organizations that serve children and families.

19838 CASE Drive (The Dominican Republic Initiative) (Soad Mansour soad.mansour@case.edu) This field experience for MSASS graduates is part of Case Drive (The Dominican Republic Initiative for Volunteer Experience) and is a collaboration of students and faculty from Case Western Reserve University established in 2004 and representing the College of Arts and Sciences; the schools of Dentistry, Engineering, Medicine, Nursing, and Social Work. Case Drive provides Case students with rich international service-learning experiences in the Dominican Republic, enabling them to develop skills in global citizenship while addressing community-identified needs that benefit community-based, non-profit organizations. Students participating in this trip must speak Spanish.

This field experience will provide an opportunity to understand the historical and socio-political factors that shape the lives of women, youth and children in Kenya. The field experience goals are to develop skills in working on the global struggle to alleviate poverty, HIV/AIDS, sex trafficking, and homelessness. The trip will include guided tours of neighborhoods, social institutions and lectures by practitioners. The role of the nongovernmental sector will be explored through visits to projects that provide community building opportunities for women, children and youth.

The 3 credit hour graduate and undergraduate course (you can sign up for Spring or Summer semester) and opportunity for 30 CEUs for social workers provides a unique opportunity for educational and professional exchange to Athens, Greece. Participants will learn about projects and initiatives in education, child welfare, health and mental health, geriatrics, human trafficking and related fields. The program would include visits to social service agencies, lectures, and opportunities for social and recreational excursions. Lectures on Greek Modern History, The Hellenic Welfare State, History of Social Work Education in Greece, and An Overview of Greek Economy will be accompanied by agency visits. Some of the selection of agencies could be a senior center, chronic psychiatric hospital, refugee center, battered women's shelter, out-patient drug center.
